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Description, Purpose, and Policies

Understanding close relationships is among the central goals of social psychology. Close relationships range from family ties to friendships to romantic and sexual relationships. Relationships science is exciting, interesting, at times controversial, and increasingly influential in understanding human social behavior. This course in close relationships will view the formation, development, maintenance, and dissolution of relationships through the theoretical lenses of biology and social psychology. The purpose of this course is to help you understand and evaluate theories, methods, and research in close relationships. Readings will be the textbook, a popular press book, and journal articles, which will be available online. Five pop guizzes and five taken-home, open-book, opennote essays (≤ 500 words each) will determine your grade. Groups of students will also present a chapter from the popular press book for extra credit. Students will uphold the University of Florida Honor Code in all aspects of this course. Class attendance is mandatory. Make-up guizzes and essays will not be given unless arranged ahead of time with the Instructor in the case of documented illnesses or emergencies.
